More and more events are being held at St. Mary In The Castle which is a Hastings venue of the future. When finished it should hold up to 800 people. With the aid of Hastings Borough Council, one million pounds has already been spent on restoring the now beautiful roof, but another million is needed to complete the lower half of the circular auditorium which has the best acoustics this contributor has ever heard. Go and have a look round on one of their open days or better still, support one of their events.

The legendary Welsh band "MAN" have been booked to play at the Marina Pavillion next January 29th (Saturday). This will be a return, long awaited by their many fans since their gigs at the Yorkshire Grey last year. Their new album called, "The Twang Dynasty", is out now, and it was good to hear ex-Pullbacks drummer, Marvin Suggs, playing tracks on his late night show on Hastings Rock Radio.

Last month "Music Files" featured a short article on "attendances" at gigs. This area is crucial to the future of live music and any landlord or band member will tell you what attendances have been dropping for a number of years. What can we do to reverse the trend or has it already started to change? What decides you whether to go out to a gig or not? It's important that you write and let us know what you think about this if we are to help change things.

Another local radio station goes on the air in Hastings on 27th November. "Hastings Local Radio" will broadcast twenty four hours a day until midnight on Christmas Eve. Station Manager Mark Briggs says the station will have "A general popular music format with a Rock feel in the evenings and particularly at weekends, when there will be a programme containing music from local sources." Flying Anvil The Carlisle - Sat 2nd October

Maidstone based Flying Anvil's gutsy Rock sound is less heavy than their name suggests. Their three piece-guitar, bass and drums sound is based more on the traditional Blood Sweat & Tears = Experience approach than guitar histrionics and volume. Drummer Raymond Massey has been teamed up with guitarist, lead singer and equipment owner Leigh Highwood for fifteen years and it shows in the fluent way they play together. Gary Bevan completes the line up on bass.

Two original numbers, "Come And Get It" and "Not This Time" in the first set, and "Going Down" at the beginning of the second were the self-penned items. Neat covers by Brian Adams and Free built up to the peak of their set following a funky rendition of "Walking The Dog". Happy people dancing all the way through the second set although they had to press for the encore, but it was worth it. An accurate slide intro led into "Tush", the end of which brought a good cheer to accompany the nods of approval.

Priced £4, Flying Anvil's four track demo tape is called "Come And Get It" and available at gigs. They are playing at the bikers get together at Cambersands in November.

As a point of interest, Drummer Ray Massey is also the lead singer with popular Kent band "The Pyromaniacs From Hell" who will have played their last ever gig on 9th October in Maidstone. Their bass player told me recently that the reason they were splitting was because, despite their popularity, they had not been able to make the elusive and distinctive "next step" up the ladder. There is every chance that a new "phoenix" like supergroup will emerge from the ashes of the Pyromaniacs. It seems to be a sort of new angle on the politics of the music business structure.

Only Fender guitars are allowed in this band though, and Ray plays a four drum Pearl kit. He asked me specifically to underline the importance of a tight drums and bass backbeat and to give this message to fellow drummers, "If you can't play four drums then you can't play fourteen".

Kakande St.Mary's in the Castle, Hastings Friday 24th Sept. 1993

This African evening began after a brief introduction by the leader of the group Ali Bangs from Guinea-West Africa. He explained that the drum patterns were designed to fit together and that the dances were not just energetic jumping around. They too were composed to convey a story. "Mandjiani" was a dance for happy people. "Nopote" to express the happiness of a family. Acknowledging the beauty of the location (Even in it's incomplete condition), Ali hoped we would all join with them, and experience the happiness released by their music. Kakande is a mixed race troup of five drummers and four dancers from as diverse origins as Africa, Wales and Brighton.

Then he joined the four other drummers who began to build up a rhythm together, working the different patterns into a mesh. Delighted applause greeted the conclusion of this opening number and by the time they had worked up the rhythm of the second piece, it was clear that they were just warming up. The acoustics of St. Mary in the Castle are probably the best that I have ever heard and as a venue it is ideally suited to this kind of performance. The trustees have stated that they are for having all types of music here and it would be interesting to hear how an electric band sounded.

More applause, and at the beginning of the third number four female dancers emerged. They wore traditional white grass skirts and black blouses with sashes, and moved fluently with the rhythms beat out by the five drummers. The natural movements of these beautiful dancers combined with the effective interlocking combination of drum patterns was a heady mixture. Rhythm is a powerful force but the joyous expression of this troup tells really what it is all about.

As promised, in "Koukou" the audience were invited to join in the dance and thirty or forty members took the option. For another half an hour the dance proceeded through a variety of rhythms at slightly different tempos. One in particular was very similar to Santana's "Soul Sacrifice" (ala Woodstock) and it is interesting to hear many of the rhythms we now take for granted, in their original context. A rewarding experience, especially if you like tapping your fingers and toes.

This gig was organised by Dave Arnold in conjunction with Hastings Arts.



The Selector The Crypt - Hastings 7th October

This maybe should have been a review and I was kind of hoping one of you would do it. The fact is I didn't make any notes because I was dancing throughout Selectors brilliant set, and I can't dance 'cos I think it's supposed to be like playing a drumkit.

Brighton band "Too Many Crooks" opened with a good dancing set of jolly Ska songs and almost drew an encore which is unusual for a support band. They would be good to go and see on their own and as they are playing at places like The Golden Martlett it is conceivable that they will pop up again in

Hastings at some point.

From the beginning of Selector's set everybody in the 150 plus crowd were dancing and singing along with wellknown hits like "On My Radio" and "Too Much Pressure", as well as a generous helping of new material. Pauline Black has become an accomplished singer and gave a beautiful performance, dancing with the infectious Rhythm and perspiring to the point of needing to hold on to a towel, although it didn't bely her good looks. Joined by a session drummer for current gigs, the band were also cooking and tight.

But this was an Experience. A Celebration. A happy mixed-race group of people shaking their chains off. Selector captured the spirit of what it used to be like to go to a gig and feel good right down to the bare bones of your soul, before we became fodder for Thatchers power trip. And the feeling spread out through the mixed-age throng so that everyone knew why they were there. The kind of night when people fall in love.

In three years of going to the Crypt I have never enjoyed myself so much as at this gig. Selector obviously enjoyed themselves too and Hastings cannot have failed to have made an impression on them. It could be, the word will go out that Hastings is a good town to play in. This gig certainly felt like the beginning of something.





Pete Prescott Turn It Up (CD)

Whilst the first two tracks on this CD are listenable in themselves the album doesn't really kick off until the third. "Get The Money And Run" and the title track, "Turn It Up" could almost have been consigned to opening slots as throwaway tracks before Pete and guitarist and co-producer Paul Sinden really get going with "Living In A Nightmare".

This third song opens with a delicate intro before sequenced drums pin down the beat into the verses, punctuated by a dramatic bridge. Top Flight backing vocals from Lianne Carroll feature throughout and you get a taste of the excellent guitar to come.

"Time For The Hero" shows this patnership is capable of clever and effective arrangements and the first classy guitar solo appears from Paul. By the time "No One Gets Out Alive" begins you notice that the length of space between the tracks is considerably longer than usual and you can have a game of "Guess when the intro starts". In "Surrender To The Night" Paul Sinden's guitar starts to shine and the build up of the medium paced song is enhanced by more outstanding backing vocals. The more beaty "Take It Away" does just that and if the volume is loud enough it is sure to get you dancing.

"Hold Tight" is a funky rocker but a critic might say that the programmed drums prevent it achieving it's full potential.

Pete's usual fine voice is never absent on this record and he really lets it loose in the sensitive arrangement of "Can't Stop Now". Again the backing vocals add depth and next to "Living In A Nightmare" this is the track of the album, with biting guitar from Paul.

"Can't Slow Down" is the final track on the album and by this point you won't want to. Another high-energy rocker, it will probably make you want to go round again.

"Thorn B Up" is a good record and if you like The Lost Boys you will like this. As a drummer though, I still think that with human drumming it would have sounded even better. The CD is priced at £8.99 and you can buy it from Jades in Castle St.

THE OTHER SIDE OF THE BAR;

It is very easy for us to want more live music in the pubs and clubs in the town. However the point we all seem to forget is CASH! A few years ago everyone had a few quid in their pocket and could afford to keep the pubs busy. But looking around pubs in the town now there are very few pubs that are paying their way. How many pubs are in the hands of either holding companies or in the hands of the receiver? When a publican goes bust, a holding company will keep the business ticking over so that the assets can be sold for a better price than if the pub was a derelict building. Holding companies do not seek to invest in pubs but to keep them as a going concern (possibly until property prices are more favorable). So, who is to blame for this quandry? Also many solvent pubs are only just solvent.

All pubs aim to run on a 50% mark-up. This means that 50% of the cost (nett) price of a pint is added on to the cost before it is sold. All figures are worked out before the publican makes any allowance for his labour, lighting, heating and advertising costs. So, when a band asks for a minimum of a hundred quid for a gig, the pub has to sell a hell of a lot of beer before he even breaks even.

The next time you are in a pub and complain about the price of a pint or complain about the lack of live music, please remember that the Guv'nor is only trying to make an honest living. In my experience from the other side of the bar, rather than local publicans being tight-arses, they really don't have a lot of spare cash in the bank.

BLOCCO LIBERDADE

Latin American Percussion Group

A "Blocco" is not, in fact, a type of pep pill. It is the name given to a Brazillian percussion band which can consist of over a hundred people. In Brazil the Bloccos are so popular and huge that they have to rehearse in football stadiums. They play mostly in Carnivals but are so popular that it is an all year round activity.

Hastings now has it's own "Blocco Liberdade" which has been formed by Damien Hammill who moved here from London earlier in the year. Damien started the group in June and it currently meets to practice each Sunday (5pm) at St Mary In The Castle.


With about fourteen regular members, at the moment, Damien hopes the ensemble will grow to between fifty and one hundred players. By next year **Blocco Liberdade** will be ready to play in **Carnivals**, **Fairs and Gigs**. one of them likely being the **Notting Hill Carnival**.

Damien says that to play in the group it is almost an advantage not to be a musician, "Everbody has fundemental Rhythm because at least we all walk 'in time'". He has most of the instruments and has been busy manufacturing more in the traditional style of the poor South American people who get together and form the groups. The instruments have exotic names such as Caixa, Repiqe, Chocalho and the large Surdo drums which form the foundation of the

enormous sound.







